How It All Came Together

Starting Point

- September 2014
 - Two / one-day training sessions offered
 - 56 service providers trained
 - Potential audiences included (youth, seniors, professionals, general public, etc.)
 - Established a monthly conference call





Outcome

- 52+ Workshops/Presentations
- 843+ Participants
- Audiences Reached Included: seniors, youth, faith groups, community professionals, general public, senior centers, senior housing, metis communities, and government staff


